Students and staff have been working incredibly hard this term and it has certainly paid off, this edition of the Sancton Wood Times shows a real sense of energy and community across the school and so many wonderful achievements to celebrate.

In August we were thrilled to receive our GCSE results, the school offered a total of 22 subjects with 93% of grades between 9-4 and 40% of the total grades were at 7-9. Our students and staff worked incredibly hard and should feel very proud of all that they achieved.

We were delighted to be recognised nationally on two fronts. Firstly, a nomination for the Independent School of the Year award for the third consecutive year, thanks to the success of our excellent Senior Careers' Day initiative. Also, our pioneering PSHE Supporters Club programme, in partnership with Cambridge United, was highlighted by the Independent Schools Council as an example of best practice and was celebrated at a special reception held at the House of Lords

This term we hosted the Thriving Minds Dukes Schools Symposium here at Sancton Wood, attended by 170 students from across Dukes' schools and the local area. This allowed students to come together and discuss global issues in finance and STEM, as well as opportunities to work creatively in art and literature. The keynote for the event was delivered by Lucy Hawking who went on to deliver a session entitled 'How to Make a Better World.' The students loved it, with one commenting 'It's the best school trip I've ever had!'

It's perhaps no surprise that interest in attending Sancton Wood is at record levels, as typified by the attendance at our Open Morning and the level of applications for places in next year's Year 7 cohort, and this term saw us admit our 400th student. This growth brings wonderful opportunities for students in areas such as the development of the enrichment programme, facilities at the school and the international trip to Iceland.

As A Community of Fun and Energy, I have no doubt we will match all these achievements and more next term! It's such a pleasure to showcase all we have achieved so far; I hope you enjoy reading about it, Richard.

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Thriving Minds Dukes Schools Symposium

Journalist and philanthropist, Lucy Hawking, daughter of the famous astrophysicist Professor Stephen Hawking, introduced the event. She encouraged pupils to think about how they could make the world a better place and not be afraid to do things differently.

Excited for the day ahead, everyone then made their war to their first chosen workshop. I attended the creative writing talk because I love English - 'Finding your Voice and Making it Heard', with novelist Jim Keeble. I found the tips on how to keep the reader interested really useful and the writing activity was a lot of fun.


Our Y10s had a great glimpse of British History in all its finery and its bloodiness when they visited the famous Tower of London this week

Careers Day

Students attended a talk by InvestIN on either interview technique (KS4) or career planning (KS3) and in addition chose four talks from a choice of 25 different career areas, each given by an expert in their field. The options were Law, Fashion Design, Education, Screen Writing, Civil Engineering, Nursing, Computer Programming, Artificial Intelligence, Sports Coaching, Creative Writing, Veterinary Science, Neurosurgery, Investment Banking, Events Planning, Forensics, Journalism, Art History, Novelist, Medicine, AI, Interior Design, Detective, Programming, Aerospace Engineering and Pathology. Enrichment


at the Senior School

Staff in the Spotlight

Edward Batty | Head of KS3, History Teacher and Senior School Enrichment Coordinator



Could you tell us a bit about your background?

I grew up in the southwest of England, just south of Cheltenham on the Cotswold edge. Both my sister and I attended a little prep school which was mainly focused on developing a love of sport and being outdoors. So, I played sport for all my childhood, rugby, cricket, cross-country running, hockey, water polo and athletics. My parents spent most of their time ferrying us around to places at the weekends and coming to watch us during the week. I then went on to a school in Cheltenham where there was more of the same focus on sport but also being involved in the CCF (Combined Cadet Force) and volunteering to coach sport in the prep school.

How did you get into teaching?

For my gap year I worked in a boarding school in South Africa. This got me into the idea of teaching as I enjoyed taking the students on expeditions, coaching sport and looking after the junior boys in their boarding house. At the weekend we would mountain bike down into the local gorge and take the boarders cliff jumping and building campfires. This was also my first taste of teaching some academic subjects and helping the younger boarders with their prep in the evenings.

After university, I applied to be an expeditioner in a school out in Swiss Alps. This first job had nothing to do with History or teaching in the classroom but was focused on taking the students camping, climbing, hiking and skiing in the local mountains. I also worked in the junior boys boarding house. As I had a History degree, the Headmaster asked me to cover some lessons and so I began to get some classroom experience and eventually did my PGCE.

What is your favourite thing about teaching your subjects?

History is about developing a perspective, not just regurgitating facts. Creating your own understanding about an event from the past and being able to sift through the problems of bias and perspective really gives you the tools to be able to think critically. Teaching History is also an excuse to discuss current issues and generally get students to be vocal and tell each other what they think about the world around them, I hate a quiet classroom

What do you like about working at Sancton Wood?

Sancton Wood is a special place, I have worked in many schools that all boast about being caring and kind. But Santon Wood is truly that place and this means that the staff are friendly, but the greatest joy is that the students are fantastic to teach. There is a two-way respect between teachers and students, and this creates a unique atmosphere.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

In my free time I either go running or cycling. I am a big fan of doing long distance walks, runs or bike rides. For a while I was focused on running ultramarathons and racing in the Alps when I lived there. I also love to go walking with my wife, son and dog around Cambridge and further afield on the weekends.

What will you be doing for the holidays?

I will be spending the time relaxing with my wife and son and seeing the rest of our family. I might also get out for a long run for a day but that will be depending on the weather.

Sancton Wood Equestrian Team


